But not, it seems in Abbey Road. Our proposal to NCC Highways to reduce the current 30mph limit, which is much too fast, to 20 mph, got short shrift, as it was deemed incompatible with the Norfolk Speed Management Strategy. However, this dates from 2014 since when things have moved on considerably. In 2020 the UK, along with Experts and Ministers from 130 countries, adopted the "Stockholm Declaration" at a Global Road Safety Conference. It included the following commitment:


[to] mandate a maximum road travel speed of 30 km/h (20 mph) in areas where vulnerable road users and vehicles mix... except where strong evidence exists that higher speeds are safe,

The Welsh and Scottish Governments are planning to replace their National 30mph limits with 20 mph (with exceptions), and Cornwall and Oxfordshire County Councils have a rolling programme of reducing speed limits – "20 mph is the new 30 mph" - for areas where there is local support.

Last week, Norfolk County Council, seemingly oblivious to all this, was discussing a draft update to the 2014 Strategy, which actually made it more difficult to set a 20 mph limit in small villages. Councillor Jim Moriarty took part in the debate and, using the above information we had provided, was able to mount a strenuous challenge, commenting that Norfolk appeared "to be going in the other direction". We wait to see whether there has been a rethink.
