Unfortunately, neither Councillors Stuart Dark nor Alistair Beales were in attendance at our meeting on January 9th, and we were not able to pursue either the issue of speed limits in the village, and the promised meeting with the Highways Department, or the ongoing discussions with Sandringham Estate about future concerts and the potential disruption to local residents. Both these matters will continue to be pursued.

It was decided that we do not need an Emergency Bleed cabinet in the village but we are continuing to research, as suggested by Joey Smithson, the Falls project mentioned in Heacham's Newsletter.

Maintenance of, and repair, to the playground is underway thanks to the efforts of Richard Gray and Terry Allen although weather conditions obviously determine when this can happen. It is worth noting, in view of the next item concerning our precept for 2024, that Terry and Richard carry out a lot of this work voluntarily with no labour charges and if this were not the case then cost to the Council would be higher.

One of our most important jobs was to set our annual precept. As you know, the precept is a tax that the Parish Council charges local electors to meet their budget requirements. It forms part of the Council Tax and was last increased in 2022; after a long discussion, we decided to increase our 2024 precept from £3,800 to £4,100, costing an average household in the parish an extra £3 per year, depending on their Council Tax band.

We still have several vacancies on the Parish Council and very much welcome new members to join us.

Going to the Dogs

Like many people, I find watching "The Repair Shop" balm for the soul. In a busy, sometimes chaotic, world it is reassuring to share the calm, gentle, slow and precise restoration of loved items. Few of us can offer up the delights of 18th century bracket clocks and 19th century Wemyss Ware as King Charles has done recently but we can all take pleasure in seeing the great skill and patience needed to breathe new life into old things. What a shame that we can't present ourselves for the attention of Jay Blades' team; I've got enough padding but my face could do with being reupholstered.

One of the main themes to come from this television programme is that the value of objects does not lie solely in financial worth. Instead, for most of us, the value is tied to memories, family history and sentiment.

I have very little of monetary value, but two things in my house which spark many memories for me are a patchwork bedcover and an old towel. The bedcover was made by my mother and each precious scrap of material has meaning and, all stitched together, they form a social history narrative of my life. It contains bits of mum's homemade dresses that I remember her wearing when I was a little girl, remnants of old curtains that used to hang in our house and offcuts from clothes she made for my own children. The other item is a ragged and threadbare towel which is a testament to long life and possibly reincarnation as it has had many different lives. I first remember it in my grandfather's house. After he died it reappeared as my swimming towel all through primary school; it then followed me to university and indeed my own children used it on many occasions after happy crabbing expeditions to Hunstanton. Sadly, it is in the later stages of its life now and is spending a well deserved, semi-retirement as a towel for the dogs. This simple piece of cloth owes me nothing, provides a wealth of memories which in turn makes the horrid job of drying wet dogs significantly less unpleasant. Ann Beasley
